

## Fidel's Story



Fidel, 29, Los Banos Resident



I woke up laying on the left side of my body, along the warm brown leather seat, covered in shards of glass, with a bloody right elbow, and a strange numbness throughout my body. My legs and my fingers were unresponsive and my arms felt extremely heavy. I had been in a terrible car accident.

I had suffered a spinal cord injury and I became a quadriplegic at the age of fourteen. The intervertebral disk between my fifth cervical vertebrae and sixth cervical vertebrae made contact with my spinal cord during the impact and impaired my spinal cord's function.

The realization that I may never walk again was the most difficult thing to accept, but the love and support of family, friends, and the hospital staff kept me strong, motivated, and positive. Overall, I was in the hospital for three months learning how to adapt to my body and how to manage it.

At the age of 18, I enrolled in Medi-Cal and in the Supplemental Security Income Disability program. These programs were, and continue to be, a crucial assistance for me. The healthcare coverage and the monthly income support my disability and my living expenses. Things can get ridiculously expensive when you live with a chronic disability.

For myself, Medi-Cal provides medical supplies, such as catheters; it also covers my medications, unexpected surgeries, dental, some medical equipment, and eye care. In 2012, I needed surgery to remove a bladder stone. I had to stay in the hospital for two weeks. Medi-Cal covered all of the expenses. There's no way I could have afforded the cost of the surgery on my own.
